What is Historical Imagination



The idea that history is more than cold logic but instead has elements of creativity.

Needs high levels of critical thinking and ingenuity.

You will need creativity to weave stories into a more complex narrative

Historians are storytellers

Function of Historical Imagination

Needed to use imagination to have empathy of the unobservable

Think of it like this we have to use sources to get into the minds of a leader.

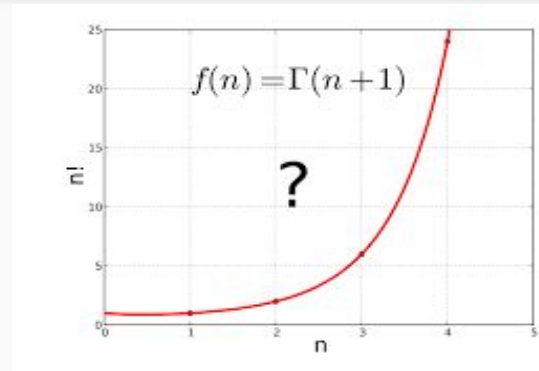
Three Parts

Interpolation

Interrogation



Re-enact

Think of yourself in the person's shoes and why they did the actions they did.

This will use some amount of imagination

Interpolation

Tasks you to fill in the gaps of the historical record

With limited sources sometimes history requires educated guesses

This action is limited by the historical record

Interrogation

Requires you and I to critically analyzing the sources

Look for hidden biases and messages

Found if you correctly imagine the proper historical context.
