
The Reign of Terror

Last time we met we talked about the causes and the events of the French Revolution. When we left off the king had officially accepted the National Assembly. In all, the French Revolution was proving to be a success. The newly formed National Assembly set themselves up with a separation of powers and the government had been officially changed by the people.

The Great Fear

- Peasants riot throughout France
- Nobles homes
 ransacked by the 3rd
 Estate




Robespierre

- Begins the <u>Reign of</u> <u>Terror</u>
- Mass <u>executions</u> of enemies of the Revolution
- Thousands sent to the guillotine



Robespierre

- A leader of the Committee of Public Safety
- "Liberty cannot be secured unless criminals lose their heads."
- <u>Jacobins</u> a radical group




Georges Danton

- <u>Helps lead</u> the *Committee of Public Safety*
- Designed to suppress opposition <u>inside</u> & <u>outside</u>
 France
- Calls for the execution of King Louis XVI




THEREIGNOFTERROR

- The Reign of Terror lasted from about July 1793 to July 1794.
 - Under Maximilien
 Robespierre, some
 40,000 people were
 executed at the guillotine
 (the national razor).




Bye Bye, Louis

- Sensing his country was going down a bad path, Louis, Marie, and their children tried to escape France
- Caught because a <u>merchant</u> recognized Louis' face from the money
- This is known as the Flight to Varennes



Bye Bye, Louis

- Tried for treason, beheaded
- Marie Antoinette <u>beheaded</u> 9 months later
- Kids left in prison
 - Son <u>died</u> of TB from prison conditions
 - Daughter-miserable life of <u>exile</u>;



Who Was Executed??

- Anyone who challenged his leadership or weren't as radical as him.
- Jean-Paul Marat (L'ami du Peuple)
 called for the execution of anyone who
 supported the king.

 Many fellow revolutionaries that challenged Robespierre's leadership became victims.



EXAMPLEOFTHE TERROR

An 18 year old youth was sentenced to die for cutting down a tree that had been planted as a symbol of liberty.





After an assassination attempt, Robespierre became more and more suspicious of everyone around him. Ultimately, he had even Danton guillotined.

She was beheaded at 12:15 p.m. on October 16, 1793. Her last words are reported to have been, "Pardon me, sir, I did not mean to do it." She accidentally stepped on the executioner's foot while climbing the scaffold.

Effects of the Revolution

By 1799, the French Revolution had dramatically changed France. It had dislodged the old social order, overthrow the monarchy, and brought the **Church** under state control. Many changes occurred in everyday life.

Changes in Daily Life

- Women gained more <u>rights</u> than held previously
- Titles were <u>eliminated</u>
- Elaborate fashions were replaced by <u>practical</u> clothes







Changes in Daily Life

- People developed a strong sense of national identity.
- Nationalism: strong feeling of pride in one's <u>country</u>



End to the Reign of Terror

- Recognition that the revolution had run amuck
- Members of the National Convention feared for their own lives
- Turned on Robespierre who was then executed
- Radical phase ended July 28, 1794
- Moderates in National Convention then drafted new, moderate form of gov (3rd since rev)




Image 1: Egyptians protest against the regime of Hosni Mubarak in January 2011. Copyright © 2011 AP Photos/Victoria Hazou.




Image 2: Egyptians celebrate the resignation of Hosni Mubarak on February 11, 2011. Getty image/AFP by Pedro Ugarte.
